




This pie chart summarises the 2021 total gross income of The Springfield Anglican College.



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STUDENT CARE

Student Care is fully integrated throughout our teaching and learning program and the culture of the College, to enhance the personal, social and academic needs of the students. We understand that for students to thrive they need to feel a sense of connection and purpose.

The two key principles that underpin the Student Care Program are:

- the right of all student to feel safe at all times and
- that there isn't any matter which is so bad that it cannot be improved by asking for help

The Head of Primary and the Head of Secondary oversee Student Care, ensuring procedures and programs are implemented and well communicated to all members of the community. On the Primary Campus, class teachers develop positive relationships with the students in their care and are the first point of contact for students and families. The Secondary Campus has an established form tutor structure overseen by Heads of Clan. This structure ensures there are a number of kev staff who establish strong. supportive relationships with the students in their nominated areas. The College has a school psychologist who is able to provide additional support to students when required.


PROGRAMS AND POLICIES

Protection for children and young people is of paramount importance in Anglican Church schools. The Springfield Anglican College has policies and procedures in place which assist us to provide a safe environment for all students and members of our school community. These are transparent and easily accessible on all our communication tools and are reviewed annually to ensure full compliance.

The College has a well communicated Bullying Policy and procedures that are supported through an open-door policy, that encourages students and parents to discuss their concerns with the relevant staff. Students in Years 4 to 12 have access to an anonymous bullying reporting system (STYMIE), empowering students to identify and alert staff of bullying concerns. The anonymous reports are forwarded directly to the Heads of Campus.

All students are proactively taught lessons focusing on anti-bullying and appropriate skill that aim to support all members of the community. Cyber Safety is also proactively taught through Digital Design and Technology lessons and invited guest speakers. Special awareness days, such as the National Day Against Bullying, are undertaken annually across the College.

STRATEGIES FOR PARENT INVOLVEMENT

The College actively fosters an opendoor policy, where parents can communicate and meet with staff when concerns arise. Scheduled Parent/Teacher Interviews are conducted twice a year, with formal reporting occurring twice in the academic year.

Parents are invited to attend a wide variety of performance, sporting and academic events held throughout the year and are welcome to attend the monthly Parents and Friends
Association (P&F) Committee meetings

Throughout 2022, traditonal P&F activities were re-introduced, including a free Mother's Day pancake breakfast, Mother's Day stall, free Father's Day BBQ, Father's Day stall, and Secondary Open Day BBQ. Alongside these events, the P&F sold supporters' caps, TSAC umbrellas, and Christmas puddings.

One of the highlights was the 90s-themed Trivia Night, which attracted over 200 members of the TSAC Community. The competitive spirit by the families, friends and staff was impressive, as were the on-theme outfits.

The P&F have continued the tradition of providing a graduation keep-sake to the graduating Year 12 students, to remember their time at TSAC as they prepare to move onto the next phase of their lives. None of these activities would be possible without the support of the dedicated members of the P&F Committee.



The College includes themed weeks and special days throughout the year to allow the whole College community to participate in socially challenging topics, in and out of the classroom.

These whole-College themed weeks included anti-bullying, cyber safety, sun safety, reconciliation and child protection. The Primary Campus also included NAIDOC, Harmony Day, and Day for Daniel in their program, while

the Secondary Campus had drug and alcohol awareness and mental health.

A Cultural Week was introduced on the Secondary Campus to celebrate the 63 different cultures represented in our TSAC community. Students and staff were immersed in dance, art, dress, music, language and food activities from all over the world, celebrating the extraordinary cultural diversity we enjoy at TSAC.

Students learned about different cultures from each other through activities during lunch and the meaningful Cultural Week Assembly.

Post-school destinations



In 2023, 100.0% of Year 12 completers from The Springfield Anglican College were engaged in education, training or employment in the year after they completed school.




Of the 42 respondents, 73.8% continued in education and training. The most common study destination was bachelor degree.




A further 26.2% transitioned directly into paid employment only.
